## A Guide to Identifying Early Warning Signs of Communication Challenges in Children Ages 4-6



If your child shows these warning signs, or you are concerned about other aspects of your child's speech and language development, contact the school's speech-language pathologist.

Some children have problems with understanding, called **receptive language**.

They may have trouble:

- Following directions
- Answering questions
- Understanding stories
- Following conversations
- Pointing to objects

Some children have problems with <u>talking</u>, called **expressive language**.

They may have trouble:

- Formulating sentences
- Asking questions
- Naming objects
- Telling stories

Additional warning signs of communication challenges:

- Not easily understood by others
- Stuttering
- Trouble interacting with peers and with turn-taking

## **Tips for Parents**

- Read to your child often. Name and point to pictures. Ask questions about the characters and what is happening in the story.
- Talk to your child. This will help your child learn new words.
- Give your child time to answer questions.
- Speak to your child in the language you know best. Be a good model for language.

## **Tips for Teachers**

- Reduce auditory and visual distractions in the classroom
- Provide extra response time
- Keep directions short and simple
- Speak clearly and slowly
- Repeat back what the student has said, modelling correct pronunciation and sentence structure
- Use visuals & graphic organizers
